- ### POINTS OF INTEREST
- ALDER GULCH (G-4)**: Rich gold placer diggings were discovered in the spring of 1863. Historic Virginia City soon became the second Territorial Capital. Reconstructed street scene and old buildings.
 - BILLINGS (F-4)**: Yellowstone Museum, Range Rider Monument, Booth Cemetery, Eastern Montana College and Rocky Mountain College. No Tech Center Area Office Bureau of Indian Affairs.
 - DALY AREA (G-4)**: Fishing and hunting country. Ghost town of Bonanza, first Territorial Capital. Site of discovery in 1862. Yellowstone National Park, archaeological and geologic sites. Western Montana College.
 - HISTORIC BATTLEFIELD VALLEY (E-2)**: Silverwater, St. Mary's Mission established in 1862. Fort Owen now a State Museum. Established in 1860. Hamilton U.S. Public Health, Rocky Mountain Laboratory.
 - GALLATIN EMPIRE (G-4)**: Bowman, named for John M. Bowman, first Territorial Governor. Site of the early center of the Area, Montana State University, Museum of the Rockies, Montana Agricultural Experiment Station.
 - HUB OF THE GREAT VALLEYS (D-2)**: Missoula, University of Montana. No Tech Center, Fort Owen now a State Museum. U.S. Forest Service and Aerial Fire Depot, Snake Jumpers Center. Fort Missoula Historical Park.
 - FLATHEAD LAKE AREA (C-2)**: Center of great year-around playground. Fine game hunting and fishing in every direction. No Tech Center, Camp and out-door recreation. Deer, bear, bighorn sheep and mountain goats. Boat, fishing, water skiing.
 - GATES OF THE MOUNTAINS (D-4)**: Discovered and named in 1865 by Lewis and Clark. Giant Springs, world's largest fresh water springs. Giant Springs State Park. Free historic site. College of Great Falls, No Tech Center, Montana School of Art and Design, Montana Art Center.
 - POMPEY'S PILAR (F-8)**: July 25, 1806. Captain William Clark carried the first party of men and animals to the top of the Lewis and Clark Gateway. (F-8) Montanans' first and best known park features one of the most beautiful limestone caverns in the Northwest. Colorful stalactites, stalagmites, clusters and flowstone provide an exciting two hour guided tour.
 - BEARTOOTH COUNTRY (G-7)**: Travel this scenic switch-back highway on an elevation of 10,347 feet for a magnificent panoramic view of lakes and country below. Early winter season. Fishing, hunting and winter sports.
 - MAKOKONA (D-2)**: Large herd of bison, also elk, pronghorn, whitetail and mule deer, and many upland birds and waterfowl. Self-guided tours from Lake Jane and Labor Day.
 - YELLOWTAN DAM AND BIGHORN CANYON NATIONAL RECREATION AREA (G-9)**: Large herd of bison, also elk, pronghorn, whitetail and mule deer, and many upland birds and waterfowl. Self-guided tours from Lake Jane and Labor Day.
 - MASON CANYON EARTHQUAKE AREA (H-3)**: At 11:37 P.M. August 17, 1929 an immense earthquake caused a giant dam and Quake Lake Memorial Park. Right at the foot of the dam.
 - NATIONAL BISON RANGE (D-2)**: Large herd of bison, also elk, pronghorn, whitetail and mule deer, and many upland birds and waterfowl. Self-guided tours from Lake Jane and Labor Day.
 - MUSEUM OF THE PLAINS INDIAN (B-3)**: An exhibition and crafts center portraying the life of the Northern Plains Indians. United States Indian School, and the early center of the Area, under supervision of the Indian Arts and Crafts Board.
 - COW CAPITAL OF THE WEST (E-1)**: Range Riders Museum, built on the site of the first cow town. Annual rodeo in July. Tourist Center. Annual rodeo in July. Tourist Center. Annual rodeo in July. Tourist Center.
 - MEDICINE ROCKS (F-12)**: 220 acres containing numerous word and odd shaped sandstone formations, a result of erosion. Located near the town of Cascade. Exhibits specimens of prehistoric life. (See also, 1500).
 - ST. LAURENCE INDIAN MISSION (F-10)**: An exhibit and crafts center portraying the life of the Northern Plains Indians. United States Indian School, and the early center of the Area, under supervision of the Indian Arts and Crafts Board.
 - LIBBY DAM (B-1)**: A 420 foot high, 2,900 foot long multi-purpose dam. Reservoir provides water resources. Forming 90-mile long Lake Koocanusa. Visitors Vista, Recreation Area.
 - ST. LAURENCE INDIAN MISSION (F-10)**: An exhibit and crafts center portraying the life of the Northern Plains Indians. United States Indian School, and the early center of the Area, under supervision of the Indian Arts and Crafts Board.
 - HUNGRIER INDIAN WILDLIFE (B-9)**: Abounds with resident and migratory waterfowl—Canada geese, ducks of all species, colonial nesting birds, and island game birds. Also antelope, deer and occasionally even elk.
