# Courtesy Car Grant Application Period open April 1 – May 31

**Reminder:** The Airport Courtesy Car Application period is from April 1-May 31. There are up to four reimbursable grants of up to \$5,000 available for a courtesy car. A municipality or third party may apply. If you would like to see a courtesy car at your airport, talk with your airport manager. It may be helpful to learn that new legislation has also reduced the insurance requirements for vehicles purchased with state grant funds. ## **Up-to-date NOTAMs Provide Critical Safety Net**

A recent phone call with an aeromedical pilot has reminded us at the MDT Aeronautics Division of the importance of Notices to Air Missions(NOTAM)s and those who place them.

Feedback provided by medivac operators described how critical weather, NOTAMs, and runway information is to making dispatch decisions for medical flights. For example, weather cameras are becoming more frequently used and relied upon as they increase in numbers, but NOTAMs are the existing format for finding and reviewing critical flight information.

NOTAMs are placed by authorized personnel at their respective locations. At larger commercial service airports, there is usually a designated person or two on the airport staff. For state-owned airports in Montana, the MDT Aeronautics Division issues NOTAMs. At non-commercial public service airports, it is usually the airport managers. The quality of information available in the system is a direct product of the information put into the system by NOTAM managers. The intent of NOTAMs is to publish relevant safety information that is of a temporary nature, such as runway closures and conditions, rather than issues that are permanent in nature or that are a known risk.

This is a gentle reminder to those with the responsibility of placing NOTAMs to ensure they are updated anytime conditions change and provide reliable safety information to all pilots. Additionally, pilots are reminded to check NOTAMs as part of their preflight planning.

In the summer of 2022, I attended the Aviation Career Exploration (ACE) Academy camp. I thought this camp was really fun! We were up early in the morning, but it was totally worth it. Everyone got to fly a couple of planes from Helena to Three Forks and other airports. There were quite a few things to see including Canyon Ferry Lake and the Missouri River that runs from Three Forks.

The staff that was there were also very nice and gave everyone a drone to fly. One of the other things we did was tour Helena College. We got to see the aviation mechanic part of the school which had planes and helicopters in the hangars and a diesel truck program.

Another thing we did was tour the air traffic control tower. The tower has no radar and goes purely by sight with binoculars, which surprised me. The control tower, which looked the same as the tower in Billings from the outside, looked out-of-date as if it was from the Cold War era.

We also got to tour the Montana Air National Guard base which is north of the Helena airport and houses US Army Black Hawks and Chinooks. The CH-90 Chinook helicopters are the army "workhorses". They are also aging and have been used since the Vietnam War and been updated multiple times.

We got to see the airport firefighter training grounds which had steel model plane part so the firefighters can practice if an emergency happens at the airport. At the Exec Air hangar there were a few medical charter planes and an ambulance.

## In Remembrance of Roger Stradley

Roger – a kind, gentle, funny, intelligent soul - passed away February 20, 2023. He lived an extraordinary life. Last of what was known in the wildlife biologist community as the Flying Stradleys, Roger was born to Jim and Margaret Stradley on April 7, 1938, in Sandpoint, Idaho. During his early years Roger lived in a lumber camp tar paper shanty along with his pet wolf and bear.

Roger moved to Belgrade, Montana with his parents in the early 1940s when Jim was stationed there to train fighter pilots for WWII. Gallatin Flying Service was born.

Roger received his pilot's license at 16 after being put through his paces by Jim. And so began a storied career. Roger was a bush pilot for 61 years logging about 80,000 hours. He held all the flying ratings except sea planes and airline transport. He was a commercial flight Instructor, instrument flight instructor, advanced ground instructor, Airframe & Engine mechanic with inspection authorization, and certified in single engine/multi engine – helicopter – glider.

His 61 year career included:

55 years - Wildlife surveys

26 years - Flight instructor

33 years - Ag pilot

25 years - Charter and air ambulance pilot

15 years - Fire patrol

10 years - Atmospheric research (cloud seeding)

20 years - Helicopter and glider pilot

Roger served a tour in Vietnam with the U.S. Army as a Green Beret and was a helicopter mechanic. The mission of his unit was to retrieve downed aircraft and occupants. He told stories of being the only soldier in the field with a downed helicopter trying to get it flying again.

On July 27, 1968 (727 like the airplane), Roger married Ann Chalmers and had two girls, Anna (Steve Roberts) and Lora. He has four step-grandchildren, Grant (Stephanie), Emery, Thomas, and James Roberts. His great loves were his family/friends, food, flying, fishing, wildlife, playing cards, music, dogs, God, and the Bible. We are sure he is flying his beloved yellow Super-Cub, 4593A, over the country he loved, keeping a watchful eye out for wildlife.

# CAP Provides Orientation Flights to Air Force Junior ROTC Cadets

While the 2023 Montana Aviation Conference was in progress in Billings; Civil Air Patrol (CAP) aircraft and pilots, from CAP's Montana Wing HQ, and 14 Air Force Junior ROTC (AFJROTC) cadets from the new AFJROTC program at Lockwood High School converged at the Billings Airport to participate in CAP's cadet orientation flight program. This program is an extension of CAP's aviation education curriculum which has been a central feature of CAP's Cadet Program since its inception, in October 1942.

CAP pilots Lt Col Peter Graf of Missoula, Captain Greg Brainerd of Livingston, and Captain Jacob Ramirez of Billings conducted the orientation flights for the AFJROTC cadets at Edwards Jet Center, which hosted this aviation

education activity on March 3-4. Each cadet orientation flight lasted about one hour and were conducted using two Cessna 182 and one Cessna 206 aircraft. The cadet orientation flight program follows the curriculum outlined in CAP's orientation flight syllabus, which covers topics including ground handling and preflight of aircraft; normal flight maneuvers; advanced flight maneuvers; interpretation of aircraft instruments; and aviation meteorology. These orientation flights add real world experience to CAP's aviation education curriculum for both CAP cadets and AFJROTC cadets, which are sister programs.

High school AFJROTC and college AFROTC cadets are allowed to participate in CAP's cadet orientation flight program thanks to a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the AFJROTC/AFROTC HQ and CAP's National HQ. CAP's orientation flight syllabus offers orientation flight curriculum in hot-air-balloons, glider aircraft, and powered aircraft. However, currently, Montana Wing HQ is only capable of providing its orientation flight program in powered aircraft. But eventually, Montana Wing HQ hopes to be able to offer orientation flights in glider aircraft, as well. In the future, the Montana Wing of CAP plans to conduct cadet orientation flights for the AFJROTC programs in Billings and Great Falls and for the college AFROTC program at MSU-Bozeman. CAP's cadet orientation flight program is funded by the Department of the Air Force.


