

Aviation Career Exploration Academy

The Montana Department of Transportation (MDT) Aeronautics Division hosted its annual Aviation Career Exploration (ACE) Academy in June. The camp allows high school students to learn about careers in aviation, explore flight, and learn what opportunities are available within the industry.

On the first day, students went on introductory flights, flew drones, toured Helena College's Airframe and Powerplant mechanic program, the Montana Army National Guard Aviation Support Facility, a fixed based operator, an air ambulance company, the Helena Airport and Air Traffic Control Tower, and an airfield fire department crash rescue facility.

On the second day, students took a field trip to Missoula. There, they toured Neptune Aviation to see their aerial firefighting aircraft, the Museum of Mountain Flying where they saw the Miss Montana DC-3, the Smokejumper Visitor Center, and Washington Companies.

On the final day, the ACE Academy hosted a small, general aviation fly-in at the Canyon Ferry airstrip. Students had the opportunity to see a variety of private aircraft, flown in by proud owners from across the state. Pilots enjoyed speaking with students and sharing their aviation stories, experiences, and careers. Students also heard from industry experts such as professional pilots, engineers, aircraft mechanics, flight nurses and paramedics, various local aviation business owners, and other aviation professionals.

Thank you to the businesses and pilots who donated their time and efforts to

Students also learned basic marshaling signals from SkyWest operations employees, fired water cannons from the firetrucks at the airport fire station,

toured the Montana Aeronautics Cessna 206 and the Air Methods medical transport helicopter, flew flight simulators and drones, and finally enjoyed some delicious ice cream bars.

Canyon Ferry Airstrip gets Updates, Scouts Work on Aviation Merit Badges

In June, Montana Aeronautics gathered at the Canyon Ferry airstrip with the East Helena Scouts, airport manager Dwight Thompson, MPA, and volunteers to paint the rocks that mark the field elevation and help Scouts work on their aviation merit badges.

After the airport work was done, Scouts completed introductory flights, learned the forces of flights, explored aviation careers, flew drones and flight simulators, and learned the basics of navigation and primary flight instruments. The evening wrapped up with burgers cooked over a campfire, donated by Dwight Thompson.

Last year, the Montana Pilots Association (MPA) and volunteers painted designated markings on the Canyon Ferry runway identifying a 900'X25' area to practice short and soft field takeoffs and landings.

This effort provides pilots an unobstructed place to measure their skills and their aircraft's capabilities without having the stress of a runway overrun or having to clear tall trees immediately off the departure or approach end to the runway. It also provides a helpful environment to demonstrate the effects of high density altitude on a short runway.

While Canyon Ferry is the first airstrip in Montana to receive these practice markings for the public to use, it won't be the last! Plans are in the works to paint additional airstrips in west central Montana this summer. If you want to help, contact MPA president, Mike Vivion at mpaprez@gmail.com.

Be sure to fly to Canyon Ferry to utilize the practice strip before hitting those short, obstructed, confined, and super fun airstrips this summer. Practice makes perfect; practicing for the first time at a challenging airstrip isn't advisable, regardless of your capabilities.

Dwight Thompson is the newly appointed airport manager of both the Townsend and Canyon Ferry airports in Broadwater County. Significant improvements have been made to both airports by Dwight in his official capacity, and through the time and resources he has volunteered. Both airports are in fantastic condition and ready for your visit thanks to Dwight!

A special thanks is owed to Dwight Thompson for the support of the Scout Aviation merit badge program, and for welcoming the practice runway markings. It is especially nice that the Canyon Ferry runway has been well maintained and is in great shape for visitors! Recent improvements include triple rolling of the runway, cactus removal in the parking area, outhouse updates, weed mitigation, and mowing. Many airports across the state rely heavily, some solely, upon volunteer power. Thank you to all volunteers for your hard work, dedication, and perseverance to maintain Montana's airports!

Aeronautics Loan & Grant Application Reminder

As a reminder to airport loan and grant applicants, the Loan and Grant online portal will accept FY 2025 applications starting July 1, 2023 - November 15, 2023. For more information, go to http://www.mdt.mt.gov/aviation/loans-grants.shtml

Additionally, make sure projects are broken down as required. As an example, asphalt projects should be broken down by runway, apron, and taxiway, not as one project lumped together.

Airport Sponsors-

As a friendly reminder, airport sponsors who were previously awarded a loan or grant from Montana Aeronautics are required to complete a status update or project closeout form annually to be eligible to apply for additional funding. If you cannot access the application on the website, you may have a previous award that needs a closeout form, or an annual status report filed.
