The UDETC offers **NO-COST DISTANCE LEARNING** opportunities featuring courses that present best practices and strategies for enforcement of underage drinking laws and efforts to reduce underage drinking. Funded by an OJJDP grant, these web-based, on-line courses are designed to provide basic information to the participant and serve as a foundation for on-site training provided by the UDETC. CONDUCTING COMPLIANCE CHECK OPERATIONS

Four-hour training provides guidelines and operational information on reducing underage alcohol sales through compliance checks of alcohol retailers



ENVIRONMENTAL STRATEGIES

Two-hour training designed to provide understanding of environmental prevention strategies and effective strategies to address underage drinking from an environmental standpoint.



PARTY PREVENTION & CONTROLLED PARTY DISPERSAL

Six-hour training that discusses the role of enforcement and community in preventing underage drinking parties and safely dispersing them when they do occur

This two-hour training identifies the complex nature of a special event and the need for effective planning, proper management, policy application, and enforcement at the event.
