Section 402 – Highway Safety Plan funding & Teen Traffic Safety Plan

Section 405(B) – Occupant Protection

Section 405 (C) – Traffic Records, Data and IT Projects

Section 405 (D) – Impaired Driving, High Visibility Enforcement, 24/7 Sobriety

Section 405 (F) – Motorcycles

23 USC 164 – DUI Courts, Law Enforcement, Media

Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IJJA) – Changes to NHTSA Programs

Triennial HSP – starting FFY24 – July 1, 23

Identify highway safety problems, establish performance measures and targets, describe the State's countermeasure strategies for programming funds to achieve its performance targets, and reports on the State's progress in achieving the targets set in the prior HSP. (60 days for NHTSA to approve)

Annual Grant Applications – due August 1, 23

Submit annual grant application that provides any necessary updates to the triennial HSP, identifies all projects and subrecipients to be funded by the State with highway safety grant funds. (60 days for NHTSA to approve)

Annual Report – Due 120 days after FY end (was 90)

Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IJJA) – Changes to NHTSA Programs

Public participation & engagement Plan

Demonstrate Constant or Improved Performance

Additional Flexibility in use of some funds.

NPRM – in comment period now - Final Rule pending

Traffic Highway Safety Funding Process

- Annual process Grant applications due March 1st through Webgrants
- Tie to CHSP Proposal needs to be a strategy in Comprehensive Highway Safety Plan (CHSP).
- Applications ranked grant decisions will be based on ranking criteria - data analysis, goals & objectives, past performance, and other considerations. Applicant adjustments if needed.
- Award Governor's Representative (GR) for Highway
 Traffic Safety Director Malcolm Long makes final
 decision Award Letters of funding sent to applicants
- NHTSA Grant projects are compiled into annual Highway Safety Plan submitted to NHTSA by July 1st annually
- Contract Development and execution by October 1st.

FFY 2024 Annual Grant Cycle (10/01/23 – 09/30/24)

- January 1, 2023 Web Grants opens for FFY2024 applications
- March 1, 2023 Applications due to SHTSS through webgrants
- March April 2023 SHTSS review and GR approve funding recommendation
- May 1 June 30, 2023 HSP prepared & approved by GR
- July 1, 2023 Highway Safety Plan due to NHTSA
- August 30, 2023- NHTSA notifies state of HSP approval status
- August 2023 Notification letters sent to applicants
- October 1, 2023 signed contracts from grantees, work can start



Child Passenger Safety (CPS)

The statewide Child Passenger Safety Technician Certification process is supported with NHTSA grant funds, and a dedicated group of trainers and CPS techs across the state continue to build the community-based availability of trained technicians to help parents and care givers learn how to install child safety seats correctly.

- Currently Montana has 294 techs and 16 instructors
- 4 Planned CPS Technician courses in EFY 2023.
- Butte, Helena, Great Falls, Billings
- Working on Hybrid course also
- Monthly newsletters sent out to technicians
- Monthly trainings held

Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP)

- Combines intensive enforcement of specific traffic safety laws
- Providing extensive communication, education, and outreach informing the public about the enforcement activity.




Safety Enforcement Traffic Team (SETT)

- Extra patrols is to improve public safety by deterring and detecting impaired driving, speeding, and a host of other traffic safety offenses.
- Provide education to the motoring public.
- Concentration in high crash corridors.
- High Visibility during special events. E.g.
 St. Patrick's Day in Butte. Participate in mobilizations.



Law Enforcement Mini-grants

- The Mini-Grant Program is a grant offered to assist Montana's less populated communities with the need for increased law enforcement patrols
- Associated with events such as rodeos, county fairs, concerts, and other large gatherings.








EMS Grant Program

- The Emergency Medical Services Grant program provides grants to emergency medical service providers for acquiring or leasing ambulances or emergency response vehicles.
- The grant is also used for purchasing equipment for training, communication, or providing medical care to patients.









SOAR, Northern Tribes DUITF, Teen Programs, Motorcycle

- SOAR Funds Coordinators on the seven land-based tribal communities who educate on all traffic safety issues including, impaired driving, occupant protection and child passenger safety – Northern Tribes DUI Task Force
- Tribal STEP Enforce traffic safety code in tribal communities focusing on impaired driving, occupant protection and child passenger safety
- Teen Partner with Family, Community and Career leaders of America to implement a Peer-to-Peer traffic safety education program mostly rural communities of the state
- Motorcycle Promote driver awareness of motorcycles during May Motorcycle awareness month. Support the Montana Motorcycle Riders Safety Training offered through Montana State University Northern.

- Personal Services
- Travel/Training Expenses
- Procurement
- Equipment
- Sponsoring Meetings/Conferences
- Public Information and Education
- Indirect Costs

Ineligible Costs

- Promotional Items
- Construction and Purchase of Office Furnishings
- Alcohol/Entertainment
- Pre-Agreement Costs



Chapter 6 – Grant Administration

Subrecipient Responsibilities

- Notify MDT of any agreement changes, including contact information
- Maintain accurate accounting records
- Ensure expenditures are eligible for reimbursement
- Participate in NHTSA Assessments, audits, MR, On-Site Reviews
- Sponsoring Meetings/Conferences
- Contact MDT for assistance!!!

MDT Responsibilities

- Review and evaluate each project
- Provide Technical Assistance
- Monitor Project
- Meet contract deadlines for reimbursement

Agreement Adjustments

- Budget transfers between category items up to 10% of the total agreement
- Changes to objectives/activities



Chapter 6 – Grant Administration (cont'd)

Agreement Amendments

- Extension of project dates
- Significant changes to project activities/objectives
- New major purchases in the original scope
- Request for additional funding
- For agreements over \$50,000, transfers of category items in excess of 10% of the total budget

Consequences of Non-Compliance

- Corrective Action Plan
- Termination of Contract



Chapter 7 – Reporting Requirements

Progress Reports

- Due 30 days following the end of the porting period as outlined in the agreement
- Includes description of:
 - Activities conducted to meet objectives
 - Relationship to time schedule
 - Progress report on each objective/goal
 - Explanation of any challenges/delays
 - Plan of action to correct deficiencies if necessary

Final Report

- Project impacts in reducing identified traffic safety issues
- Contributions to the Highway Safety Program
- Progress toward goals as identified in agreement



Chapter 8 – Reimbursement Process

WebGrants - Subrecipient

- Reimbursement of claims is through WebGrants
- Each claim should:
 - Cost corresponding to authorized line items
 - Appropriate supporting document for all expenditures
 - Cannot exceed the budgeted amount without first consulting MDT program manager

MDT Review

- Ensure within approved budget
- Review supporting documentation
- Expenditures in the proper category
- Ensure Authorized person has certified expenditures



Chapter 9 – Project Monitoring

Pre-Award Risk Assessment

- Required by Federal Government
- Evaluate subrecipient for risk of noncompliance by considering subrecipient's
 - Prior experience
 - Results of Single Audit
 - New personnel or changes in organization

Desk Review

- Conducted quarterly/period following submission of status report within WebGrants
- Validates activities in line with objectives
- Provide technical assistance if problems arise

Chapter 9 – Project Monitoring (cont'd)

On-Site Review

Low Risk

- Contracts over \$35,000 with "low" risk require onsite annually for first three years
- Contracts over \$35,000 with "low" risk and under contract for three ore more years require on-site once every two years

Medium Risk

- Schedule financial review with subrecipient
- Withhold payments pending single audit results, applicable
- Provide training and technical assistance on program related matter
- Conduct on-site as determined by staff

Chapter 9 – Project Monitoring (cont'd)

On-Site Review (cont'd) High Risk

- Review by MDT External Audit
- Require 100% documentation for reimbursement
- Withhold full or partial payments pending single audit results, if applicable
- Review corrective actions and ensure follow-up on plan
- Provide training and technical assistance
- Consider whether results of audits necessitate adjustments to the pass-through entities records
- Consider taking enforcement action against the noncompliance subrecipient




