Education

- Enhance community awareness & education
- Reinvigorate & enhance SOAR
- More use & development of tribal-specific materials & outreach (safety messaging using local kids)



Education

 Identify existing education efforts and opportunities to collaborate at both the individual & community levels -(identify partners & work together)

 Use variable message signs to convey safety messaging



- Enforcement
 - DUI "Blitz campaigns"
 - Radar-controlled speed indicator signs in conjunction with enforcement
 - Increased enforcement, need more officers



Enforcement

- "Movie star officers" are needed to speak with kids
 & public
- Task force to target DUI enforcement
- Expand DUI Court(s)
- 24/7 sobriety program



EMS

- Research project for Best Practices in Rural Emergency Response
- Improve retention of EMS workers
- Provide better education to EMS workers

Provide competitive wages and insurance to EMS workers

Engineering

 Run-off-the road crashes are a major cause of serious and fatal injuries, need to implement roadway changes to address them

 Streamlined process & coordination for road closures due to weather



Safety Priorities

- Continue to enhance coordination among tribal organizations, state agencies and counties
- Work together to improve crash data collection and sharing
- Increased law enforcement



Next Steps

- Tribal Safety Work Group (i.e. Emphasis Area Team) will develop strategies to address the tribal safety priorities for the 2012 Summit.
