


Classroom Facility 1979-2016

Montana DRIVE

- Montana DRIVE (OPI) has a lease with the Lewistown Airport Board for the use of the facility.
- The driving track was completely resurfaced in 2004 with a grant from the State of Montana for a cost of \$750,000 dollars. It needs to be done again...
- In 2016 the three vintage driver education trailers were replaced with a modern building with a new classroom, two bathroom with toilets, air conditioning, heat, and office area.
- Each day has room for 12 students.
- The staff consists of 13 active professional instructors with <u>decades of experience</u> teaching people how to drive.




























Montana DRIVE Instructors

Everyday at Montana DRIVE

-We teach six different behind-the-wheel exercises along with 1.5 hours of classroom instruction.

Sections:

- Evasive Steering
- Controlled Braking
- Off-Road Recovery
- Variable Cornering
- Skid Control
- Target/Balance (Skid Monster)
- -Each student takes each class twice, once in the morning, once in the afternoon. They drive a different type of vehicle in the morning and in the afternoon.
- -The MT. DRIVE fleet consists of sedans, minivan, pick-up truck, ambulance, school buses, and a city bus for a total of 17 vehicles in our fleet.









Controlled Braking Another cow in your lane 60 feet 50 feet 12 Foot Lane Simulates coming over the crest of a hill and finding several cows in the road.

You must steer and brake at the same time to avoid hitting the cows.



Cornering






Use lane position to your advantage, enter high/outside.


Use as little steering input as possible to stay in lane. Accelerate out of corners!

Be smooth—avoid choppy braking, accelerating and steering.





Off-Road Recovery













When vehicle starts to slide:

Keep eyes on "target"

Look to where you want to go.

Avoid Braking.

Avoid Acceleration.

One in four accidents involve skidding.

64 ft.

Change in speed or direction are too abrupt for tire and road condition.

As little as .080" water can cause hydroplane.

Tire pressure, design and amount of tread affect hydroplane potential.



Vehicle Control Monster a.k.a. Skid Monster

- Focuses on Foundational Vehicle Control Skills.
- When to brake.
- When to accelerate.
- Vision; Motion;
 Direction/Steering.
- Skills will improve control in all critical driving situations.

Students learn to keep the car "in-balance".






- Simulates high speed dynamics at 10 mph.
- 10 mph = 30 mph real world.
- 20 mph = 60 mph real world.
- Without risk learn what happened.
- What went wrong, why and how to correct a failure.
